GARRETH LYNCH

At age ten, Garreth Lynch, PhD, rode the #22 bus downtown to the Lincoln Square Clubhouse—his favorite place in Worcester. There, among kids from different backgrounds, he learned vital social skills and sparked a lifelong passion for public speaking and leadership.

The eldest of five, Garreth's leadership skills were shaped both at home and at "the Club." After graduating from Assumption Prep, he earned degrees from Westfield State College (BA), Suffolk University (MPA), and SUNY Albany (PhD in Organizational Behavior and Theory)—a path of learning he traces back to Lincoln Square.

While at Westfield State, Garreth settled in Westfield, married Cheryl (his wife of 59 years), raised two daughters, taught English at Westfield High, served as State Representative, and later, as mayor. In 1969, he co-founded the Westfield Boys Club, inspired by his Worcester roots.

Today, he is Executive Director of the Boys & Girls Club of Plymouth, continuing to give back—another lasting lesson from Lincoln Square.



LORIMAR MATEO GARCIA

Lorimar Mateo Garcia, LCSW, is a Domestic Violence Specialist with the Massachusetts Department of Transitional Assistance, where she advocates for survivors through trauma-informed care and access to vital resources.

Born in Puerto Rico and raised in Worcester, she's deeply rooted in the community—from her days as a student leader and MVP basketball player at Burncoat High, to her continued grassroots involvement. A graduate of Anna Maria College (B.S. in Criminal Justice) and Westfield State University (MSW), Lorimar also holds a theological diploma from Theological Institute of Bethsaida, crediting her faith—and the influence of her late grandmother—for guiding her life and work. She has partnered with local leaders on community -building initiatives and mentored youth as a basketball coach with Trinity Lutheran's Youth League.

Currently, she serves on the Advisory Council for Rise Above, supporting children in foster care. Through every role, Lorimar leads with empathy, authenticity, and a deep commitment to justice and healing.

LAURA RODRIGUEZ

Laura is a passionate educator and a talented hairstylist who credits much of her personal and professional growth to the time she had at the Boys and Girls Club. Growing up, she eagerly spent countless hours at the club, forming lasting friendships and staying engaged in creative pursuits that kept her out of trouble. It was there that she discovered a love for art, which led her to become the club's art teacher, inspiring the next generation of club kids by sharing her passion and creativity.

After enrolling in cosmetology school, Laura thrived as a hairstylist for over 20 years, honing her craft and developing a successful career in the beauty industry. However, the call to teach was never far away. With a renewed focus, she pursued a license in education, transitioning to a role as a vocational cosmetology teacher. For over a decade, Laura has dedicated her career to shaping aspiring cosmetologists, sharing not only her expertise but also the invaluable lessons learned from her years at the Boys and Girls Club. With a deep belief in the power of mentorship, she is committed to empowering the next generation and fostering creativity in every student she encounters.



RICARDO "RICKY" RODRIGUEZ

Rickey grew up as one of six children in Great Brook Valley, raised by a mother without a high school diploma and a father who struggled with addiction and incarceration. Labeled early on as a troubled student with a learning disability, Rickey found a safe haven at the Boys and Girls Club—a place where kids could just be kids, free of judgment and worry. Thanks to the Club, which even provided transportation, Rickey discovered a sense of belonging and support that still resonates with him today—he still has his membership card from 1991.

With encouragement from mentors like his cousin Carlos Garcia, Rickey began giving back as a peer leader with the Henry Lee Willis Community Center. He then became a tobacco youth advisor with the Great Brook Valley Health Center, supervised the Graffiti Removal Program in the neighborhood, and created the Scattered Site Summer Program through the Worcester Housing Authority to provide daily recreation for underserved youth.

While supporting his community, Rickey pursued higher education—earning an associate degree from Quinsigamond Community College and a bachelor's in Sociology from UMass Amherst with a concentration in social services. His career has included roles as a social worker for at-risk foster children, clinician and team lead at Youth Net, social service coordinator for the elderly and disabled, therapeutic mentor, and community support worker.

Today, Rickey works as a Residential Council II for Community Healthlink through UMass Memorial, helping adults with dual diagnoses live independently. Throughout it all, he continues to refer kids to the Boys and Girls Club and proudly carries the identity of a "Club kid"—a reminder of where it all began.




ANTHONY "TONY" ORAMA

Tony has been a part of the Boys & Girls Club since the age of six, beginning his journey at the Great Brook Valley location, where he participated in the grand opening of the gymnasium. He later attended the Ionic Avenue club and continued his involvement through the grand opening of the Kilby Street Boys & Girls Club.

Over the years, Tony has proudly represented the Boys & Girls Club of Worcester at a national event that brought together Clubs from across the United States. He also traveled to Canada to compete in a major basketball tournament on behalf of the Club. His dedication extends beyond participation—Tony has volunteered countless hours supporting a variety of programs, including summer initiatives designed to engage and inspire local youth. He also helped secure a grant and donation from a former employer to benefit the Club's summer programming.

Currently, Tony is pursuing a degree in Human Services while actively coaching basketball at Doherty High School. He also coaches a 6th-grade AAU basketball team and volunteers as a youth coach in local church leagues throughout Worcester. With over a decade of experience in coaching, mentoring, and youth development, Tony remains deeply committed to guiding and empowering the next generation.



BOB DONAHUE

Bob Donahue was a life long resident of the city of Worcester. As a youth, growing up in the Main South section of the city, Bob spent countless hours at the Ionic Ave Boys Club. Bob always spoke of enjoyment and involvement at his "home away from home ". He often gave credit to what the Boys Club gave and offered to him growing up in those early years. His involvement in athletics began there and extended to his days at St Peters High School where he played football, basketball, and baseball. Along with his involvement in team sports, Bob was an avid swimmer. Swimming was another skill he developed at a young age at Ionic Ave and he continued to swim on a regular basis well into his 80"s.

Following high school, Bob was drafted in the US Army serving his country from 1952-1954. Following his military service, Bob became a civil engineer for the Mass Department of Public Works where he spent his entire career. Bob married his wife Mary in 1953 and raised 6 children .

While working to raise his family, Bob was also a renowned and highly respected basketball official. Bob officiated at the high school and collegiate levels, officiating numerous Clark and District finals as well as State Championship games in the old Boston Garden. Bob is a past president of the Central Mass Board of Basketball officials Board 26. During his time on the board, he was involved in creating the Cervini Hardy award given annually to a Central Mass school for exemplary sportsmanship.

SPEAKING UP AWARD, JULIE DAVENPORT

Julie began her community work in Worcester in 2014 through the Young Professional Women's Association (YPWA), where she volunteered with local nonprofits including the Boys & Girls Club, Abby's House, and Habitat for Humanity. As a YPWA board member (2016–2018), she helped grow the organization's impact and recognition.

In 2018, she joined the "Evening in the Park" Committee, leading Worcester's first outdoor gala in Elm Park to record-breaking success for the Boys & Girls Club. Julie was part of the Leadership Worcester Class of 2019 and currently serves as Board President of Habitat for Humanity MetroWest/Greater Worcester.

She has also been a key member of the CASA Project's Champions for Children Committee since 2019, chaired its 2022 golf tournament, and helped achieve record fundraising milestones. In 2023, she joined the Boys & Girls Club's Festival of Trees Committee, personally designing eight holiday tree displays over two years, with more planned for 2025.
